When asked about her first impressions of Terre Haute, Mihwa Yang of South Korea replied, “The people are very kind, the air is fresh, and there are nice parks”.

Mihwa and her daughter, Minji Joo arrived on August 20th as one of two Rotary Ambassadorial Scholars studying at ISU this year.

With help from club member Paul Stanley, Mihwa and Minji (pronounced Me-Wah & Min-Gee) settled in the ISU Family Housing complex off Farrington Street.

In the days since her arrival, Paul arranged the purchase of car insurance and a Kia Spectra. Mi-

hwa, has an International Driving License, has been studying to take the Indiana driving license test.

Additionally, Paul helped get Minji enrolled in Kindergarten at Farrington Grove elementary school. Mihwa hopes Minji will learn English quickly.

Mihwa comes from JinJu, a town four hours south of Seoul. She is the eldest of four girls, “which is very difficult for my mother as Korea is a son oriented culture”, she said.

She received at Master’s degree in Buffalo, New York three years ago and is here to work on her PhD in Curriculum and Instruction Media

Technology.

Mihwa enjoys hobbies such as water color painting and pastels. She and Minja like to swim.

Food is a challenge and they were glad to find the Asian Market where they could buy Kim-Chie, a spicy cabbage. A staple of their diet is fish so Mihwa wonders how her daughter will do in our Mcmeat centered culture.

Mihwa has met other Korean students but is very anxious to make American friends.
