North Interact Committed to Service; Rotary Donates \$325

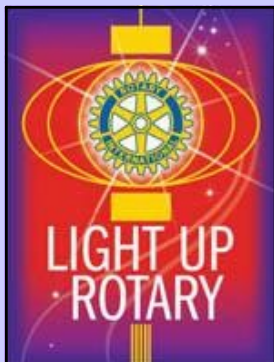

Reflecting on 60 Years in Rotary

David Mitchell's membership in Rotary did not start in Terre Haute or even in the United States. It began when he joined the Rotary Club of Oruro, Bolivia in April of 1955. David's first assignment from his employer, Canadian International Power Company, was manager of the power company in Oruro. The city is in west central Bolivia and known as a center for tin and silver mining. Before returning to his hometown of Terre Haute, David was a Rotarian at clubs in LaPaz, Bolivia (twice); San Salvador, El Salvador; Montreal, Quebec; and Cincinnati, Ohio.

Even though, he attended Rotary clubs in four different countries, David said what occurred during the meetings and the activities of the clubs was nearly the same. "Language was the major difference. In Bolivia and El Salvador, Spanish was spoken and in

Montreal it was French, at times," he noted. "If you were in top management, Rotary was the club to be in. The Rotary Club of LaPaz was unique because it owned the building where the club met." The largest Rotary club he joined was in Cincinnati which had a membership of over 500. David served as treasurer of the El Salvador Rotary Club during a period when he managed the local power company. He oversaw the electrification of 125 villages and towns, city street lighting was relamped and a new office building was constructed.

While dues provided the funds to operate the clubs, David remembered a unique fund-raising event sponsored by the LaPaz club, "The members sponsored a dog show. One thing they learned was to never select a veterinarian to be a judge because he always picked his own dogs as the winners." Our club has benefited from David's Ro-

tary and life experiences in many ways. Through his efforts as international service chair our club partnered with Rotarians in Bolivia to bring water to different villages in that nation. David has introduced us to international students attending local colleges who were his guests at our meetings. And, his Rotary experiences have enabled him to provide valuable counsel at our Board of Directors meetings. Several times, David has made contributions to the Paul Harris Fund.

Often when a person is honored for long-time membership in Rotary, the Rotarian has been a member of one club. David's continued involvement in Rotary while moving to different countries makes his commitment to Rotary even more remarkable. Congratulations, David, for 60 years of service above self!

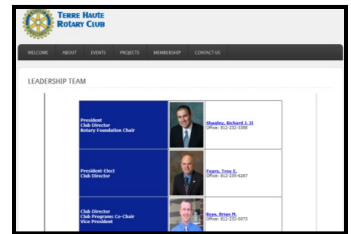
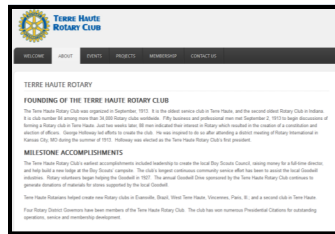
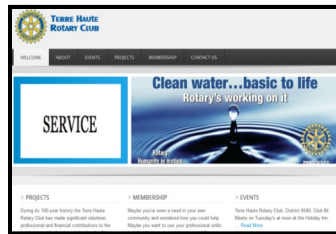
Club Web Site Updated and Expanded

Woods' Book Project Raises Funds for Elementary School

Often during her visits to read to third-graders at Farrington Grove Elementary School, the students asked Rotarian Marty Woods when she was going to write a book. "I told them I would, but they had to give me an idea for the book. A book featuring a mermaid was chosen," Woods said.

The children's suggestion resulted in "A Mermaid's Tail." The 18-page, illustrated book is a story about Pearl the mermaid. Pearl doesn't know why her tail is different from the other merchildren until her new friend helps her understand that being different can sometimes be a good thing, Woods explains in summarizing the book.

As Woods began creating the book, she decided it would not only be a gift for the students, but it could also help the school's Parent/Teacher Organization (PTO) project to raise funds for new playground equipment.

"Creating the book was more difficult than I expected," said Woods, who showed a draft to the students when

she thought the book was ready. "Their reaction was that it didn't have enough pictures. I painted more illustrations but

needed help with the layout," said Woods, who lives in Farrington's Grove. Woods didn't have to look very far. Lay-

out design was provided by Ashley Mumma, a graphic artist with Big Picture Data Imaging in Terre Haute. "Ashley scanned all my illustrations and then did the layout on the computer. She is very talented," Woods said.

Woods hopes sales of the book will help the school's PTO achieve its \$30,000 goal. The PTO has already met a \$5,000 challenge from an anonymous donor who matched those funds dollar-for-dollar. The donor has also agreed to a second match if the PTO can raise another \$3,000 by the end of the school year. Woods said about 100 books have been sold thus far. The sale price is \$9.99 including tax, and \$5.00 per book is being donated to the PTO fund drive.
