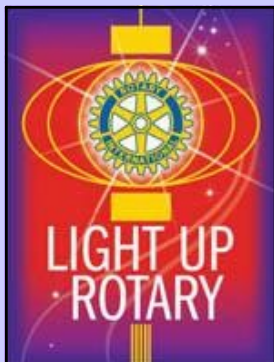

1 will be \$240 of which \$65 is distributed to the local foundation and is considered a charitable deduction.

collecting food for the Stamp Out Hunger project or loading donations into a Goodwill truck, Troy has been there when Rotary helps the community. Troy's election as vice president also meant membership on the club's board of directors. His involvement has also included serving as Sargent-at-Arms, a position that did not fulfill all his expectations. "When he was club president, Santhana Naidu promised me a sword that I could bear each week. It never materialized," he noted.

While growing up in Terre Haute, Troy learned about Rotary's reputation for its service to the community and the quality of its membership. "When I was in the field of education for 12 years my schedule didn't permit me to become a member. Once I became executive director of the United Way of

the Wabash Valley, seven years ago, Bob Quatroche brought me as a guest to a couple of Rotary meetings and I was hooked," he recalled.

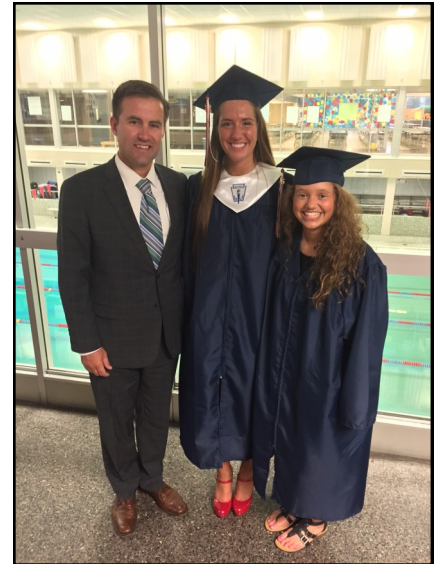
Doing What Rotarians Do Best – Service to the Community
