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Planning for Our Club's Future

Rotary Club of Terre Haute

What will be the status of the Rotary Club of Terre Haute in five years? Shouldn't we plan for the future, rather than simply hope for the best? Our Board of Directors has taken the first step to plan for an even better Rotary club in the years ahead. The Board, at its November meeting, voted to participate in Rotary International's Club Visioning

Process to create a strategic plan for the Rotary Club of Terre Haute. The visioning process will be facilitated by Rotarians from other clubs in the district who have completed Rotary International training for their roles. A one-time, four-hour, evening session will be conducted early next year. Fifteen to 20 members will be needed to participate which should include new and experienced Rotarians, representatives from the board of directors and current officers. The

outcomes from this planning session should include: What the club stands for in our community, membership goals for the next five

years, identification of our club's attributes, identifying three objectives for each Avenue of Service, and creating a club leadership development plan.

Judi Buckalew has a unique history with Rotary. She is the only member of our club who has been bestowed with recognition as an honorary Rotarian before she was inducted as a regular member. Judi received honorary status in Rotary from a club in upstate New York because of her contributions as a nurse at a Rotary-sponsored summer camp for children with disabilities. On October 1, the total assets in the Rotary Club of Terre Haute Foundation increased to a value of \$100,651, according to Treasurer Mike Collins. As a comparison, ten

years ago, the foundation's value was \$60,712. The total will increase further with the donation from the recent "Rudy" movie fundraiser.

Increasing Our Support for Worldwide Rotary Impact

As the result of the success this year of the two movierelated fundraisers, our club has increased its involvement in Rotary's global impact. Our club will donate approximately \$6,000 to the Rotary International Foundation which will be the largest one-year total in ten years (see next story). As a Rotarian, we are part of something much bigger than our own club and its volunteerism. The RI Foundation's impact worldwide is nothing short of incredible. Consider these figures for RI grants in 2014-15: \$123 million to eradicate polio, \$20 million for clean water projects, \$19.8 million to fight disease, \$11.2 million to grow local economies, \$8 million for education, \$5.7 million to help mothers and children and \$4 million to promote peace. We should be proud that we are helping support these efforts as the RI Foundation celebrates its 100th anniversary.

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Club History - 10 Years Ago

Eleven members visited Rotary International headquarters in Evanston, III., and had the opportunity to meet the president and president-elect of RI. It was a rare opportunity to meet the RI President at headquarters because the person in that position is usually out of the office traveling around the world representing Rotary. President Tom Dever coordi-

nated a campaign to increase the club's support to the Rotary International Foundation which resulted in donations totaling \$10,000. Yearly attendance at the end of 2006 was 74 percent.

Encouraging Students to Put Service Above Self

Congratulations to Nancy Rogers, the club's 2016 Vocational Service Award recipient. Nancy is vice president for university engagement at Indiana State University. She was selected for the award because of her leadership that has resulted in ISU being honored for its development of one of

the nation's best community engagement and service learning programs. For the past two years, ISU has been ranked number one, among 277 national universities, by Washington Monthly magazine for the amount of hours its student devoted to community service. The university most recently reported more than 1.1 million hours of service by nearly 11,500 students with more than 150 community partners.

ISU defines service learning as a teaching and learning strategy that integrates meaningful community service with instruction and reflection to enrich the learning experience, teach civic responsibility, and strengthen communities. Nancy is a past president of the Rotary Club of Terre Haute

and has served on its board of directors. She joined the ISU faculty in 1995. Rogers was named vice president for university engagement and professor of kinesiology, recreation and sport in 2009. She previously served as an associate vice president and associate professor. Rogers over-

sees the university's Business Engagement Center, career services, student employment, Hulman Center and the Offices of Conferences and Special Events. She earned a bachelor of science degree in recreation and park administration from Western Illinois University, the master of science in recreation and park administration and a PhD in human performance with an emphasis in leisure behavior from Indiana University.

She has been active as a board member and volunteer in other community organizations including the United Way of the Wabash Valley, Wabash Valley Community Foundation, and the Wabash River Development and Beautification, Inc.
