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Volunteer a Few Hours to Help Feed the Hungry

It will only take a few hours of your time on Saturday, May 14. The results of your volunteer efforts will impact nearly 15,000 people in Vigo County. Our club is continuing its support of the Stamp Out Hunger campaign coordinated by the National Association of Letter Carriers. The local portion of the national effort supports the Catholic Charities Food Bank, its soup kitchens network and the thousands of people who depend on it for a sustainable meal.

"This is one of our most significant food drives annually just on sheer numbers but also by the geographic area it reaches," explained John Etling, director, Catholic Charities. Etling says volunteers needed to collect the bags from the front porches throughout the community. "Volunteers can provide a few hours or the entire day. This food drive puts a tremendous stress on our staff, but they are very enthusiastic about the amount of food we receive. It's a true labor of love. The help volunteers provide is invaluable," Etling said.



Club Community Service Chairman Scott Williams is recruiting Rotary volunteers. Sign-up sheets and further details will be provided at future meetings. Volunteers report to the Catholic Charities Food Bank at 14th and Chestnut to select a neighborhood to canvass for bags with donated food. Empty bags were distributed earlier by postal workers. This will be the 24th year for the Stamp Out Hunger campaign, which has collected more than 950,000 lbs. of food which equates to more than 792,000 meals.

According to Etling, "In this day and age many people simply can't fathom the extent to which food insecurity exists within their own neighborhoods. It can be easy to overlook in the course of their busy lives we all lead but it's out there. I would encourage anyone to visit a soup kitchen or a food pantry and see the people who rely on these programs. If that doesn't help them to better understand the problem, I'm not sure what else can."

Club Database a Useful Resource

You are able to keep your profile on the Rotary district data base (DACdb - District and Club Database) current, search for profiles of club members and find club-related data. Log in by entering your username (The default is your e-mail address, then your password, which is usually your Rotary International member ID#. Your RI member ID is the seven-digit number without the first and last digits. Your password may be changed to one of your choice. You can find your number on your Rotary Magazine label just

above your name. Or, you can select your own password. Once in the database, you can edit or update any of your information. If you'd rather have Dee Walters update your information for you, e-mail the information to her at map-walt@ma.rr.com She can also provide you with your member ID number.
