Max's yard needed cleaned up, so a dozen Rotarians spent a couple of hours July 14 and spruced up the Max Ehrmann Plaza (aka the Crossroads of America). The Saturday work was the second time this year Rotarians have mulched, pulled weeds, trimmed bushes and trees at the plaza. There was discussion at the work session about Rotarians improving the landscaping by planting daffodils and other spring blooming flowers in late fall. The cleanup was aided by a

Valley by distributing dictionaries and reading to school children. In addition, our club donated a carload of toys to disadvantaged children at Christmas. We helped the needy by dedicating over 50 volunteer hours to Salvation Army bell ringing and gathering food donations for Catholic Charities. Our Goodwill drive netted 17,423 pounds of donations, a 200 percent increase over last year. Rotarians are not afraid to get dirty either. We devoted over 30 hours of labor to clean and mulch Max Erhmann Memorial Plaza, and, in April, we helped Trees, Inc. plant 12 trees along south Seventh Street. The caring spirit of our club humbles me.

Thanks to the hard work of Nick Mahurin and our programs committee, our noon gatherings have been entertaining and, at times, inspiring. Numerous programs have exposed that there is still great need in our community and, at times, a void of leadership to make a difference. As Rotarians, we think differently and act responsibly. Our club, through its members, connects a wealth of resources and there are seemingly limitless avenues of service to direct goodwill.
